The web-based software is extensively tested on a Windows platform with the latest Chrome, Firefox, Microsoft Edge and other Mozilla based-browsers. We cannot guarantee that all the features will work on other operating systems and other browsers, but from what the members tell us – most everything works on just about every combination. Keep in mind browsers are constantly in a flux change. While we try our best to stay current with changes every once in a while something will slip through the cracks.

Navigation

The website is designed for easy navigation through the hierarchy. Main sections of the site are defined in the header and footer at the top and bottom of each page, as well as links in many of the screens. Clicking on one of these directs you to the main page of that section, all of which have a standard look and easy one-click access to any of the other main sections. Most interior pages, no matter how deep in the hierarchy, have this standard way of jumping back to the homepage or to the main page of any major section.

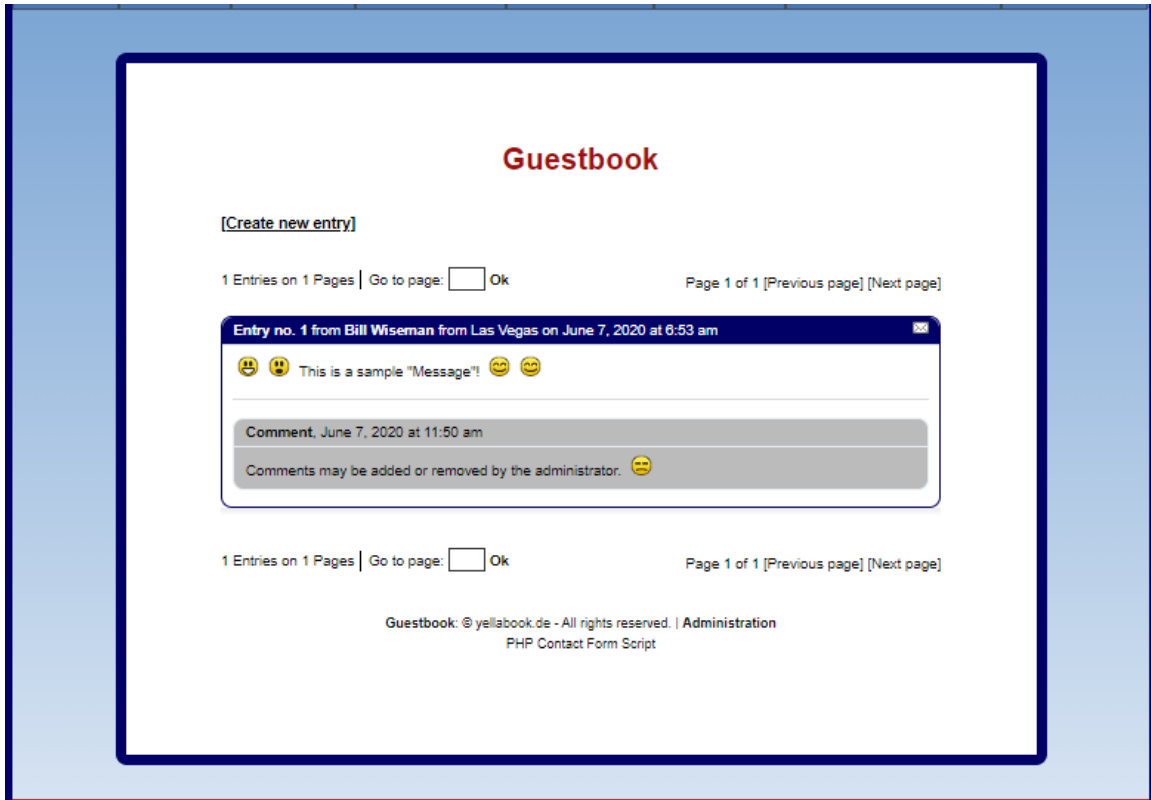



Volunteers and Compensation

What is Considered a "Tipped Employee"? Under the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA), a 'tipped employee' is someone in an occupation in which he or she customarily and regularly receives more than \$30 per month in tips. An employer of a tipped employee is only required to pay \$2.13 per hour in direct wages if that amount, combined with the tips received, equals the federal minimum wage. Many states, however, require higher direct wage amounts for tipped employees. Nevada minimum wage for tipped employees without health insurance benefits is \$8.25 per hour.

Nevada State Law Controlling the Purchase of Alcoholic Beverages for sale in the Lodge

NRS 369.487 Retailers to purchase liquor only from state-licensed wholesalers; exceptions. Except as otherwise provided in NRS 369.4865 and 597.240, no retailer or retail liquor dealer may purchase any liquor from other than a state-licensed wholesaler. [Part 17:160:1935; A 1945, 371; 1943 NCL A§ 3690.17]—(NRS A 1991, 109; 2001 Special Session, 165)

NRS 369.488 Sources for purchase of liquor by retailer:

1. Except as otherwise provided in NRS 369.4865, a retailer may purchase liquor only from:

- (a) The importer designated by the supplier pursuant to NRS 369.386 to import that liquor if that importer is also a wholesaler; or
- (b) A wholesaler who purchased liquor from the importer designated by the supplier pursuant to NRS 369.386 to import that liquor.

2. As used in this section, "supplier" means the brewer, distiller, manufacturer, producer, vintner or bottler of liquor, or his or her designated agent.

Americanism

At the Grand Lodge Convention in 1961 at Miami Beach, the committee on Americanism was created and charged with "implementing the patriotic activities of the Order and its subordinate Lodges."

The creation of the Elks Americanism Committee in 1961 met an important need in a critical time in our history. The Committee provided our Lodges with constructive and definite programs for strengthening the spirit of American patriotism in their communities, and vigorously promoting their use. The response of our Lodges was both prompt and enthusiastic, and the result has been a tremendous expansion in the Order's patriotic activities... and a major contribution to the security of this nation.

Our Government has, time and again, enlisted the aid of the Order in patriotic undertakings where civilian cooperation was deemed essential.

Membership in the Order of Elks is a "badge of citizenship", for none but an American can be an Elk. "Love of Country, Home and Mind" are its principal tenets, and our country's flag is raised in silken benediction over the Altar of every Elks Lodge.

With its all pervading spirit of good will, the Order makes an irresistible appeal to men and women who deeply love their country, cherish fraternal association, and welcome an opportunity to serve their communities.

Flag Day - June 14 (A special day in Elk history and tradition)

On June 14, 1777, the Continental Congress adopted the Stars and Strips as the new nation's flag. There were individuals and organizations that promoted the idea of observing that anniversary each year, but the idea really took off when the Elks decided in 1907 to have each of its lodges mark the date. A decade later, as hundreds of thousands of their brothers fought in Europe, the Elks persuaded President Woodrow Wilson to recognize Flag Day with a proclamation. With the armistice ending World War I, the June 14 celebrations took on a new importance for returning veterans. One who was especially impressed by the ceremonies in his Elks Lodge in Independence, Missouri, was Harry Truman, who had commanded an infantry company in France. When he became President, Truman issued proclamations for Flag Day as veterans returned from another war, but he also felt that the occasion should have legal sanction. Congress responded by passing a joint resolution and the practice of setting aside June 14 of each year as a special day to honor the flag was codified into law.

Contact your local TV stations and cable systems and furnish them with a photo or slide of Old Glory, flying over the Elks lodge or a local landmark. Ask them to remind viewers during station breaks that June 14 is a time to honor America and her troops by honoring the Flag.

"Old Glory"

The name "Old Glory" was first applied to the U.S. flag by a young sea captain who lived in Salem, Mass. On his twenty-first birthday, March 17, 1824, Capt. William Driver was presented a beautiful flag by his mother and a group of local young ladies. Driver was delighted with the gift. He exclaimed, "I name her 'Old Glory.'" Then Old Glory accompanied the captain on his many voyages.

Captain Driver quit the sea in 1837 and settled in Nashville, Tenn. On patriotic days, he displayed Old Glory proudly from a rope extending from his house to a tree across the street. After Tennessee seceded from the Union in 1861, Captain Driver hid Old Glory by sewing the flag inside a comforter. When Union soldiers entered Nashville on February 25, 1862, Driver removed Old Glory from its hiding place, carried the flag to the state capitol building, and proudly raised it for all to see.

Shortly before his death, the old sea captain placed a small bundle into the arms of his daughter. He said to her, "Mary Jane, this is my ship flag, Old Glory. It has been my constant companion. I love it as a mother loves her child. Cherish it as I have cherished it."

The flag remained as a precious heirloom in the Driver family until 1922. Then it was sent to the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C., where it is carefully preserved under glass today.

Several of our Grand Exalted Rulers have stated that in their travels, they found those associated with the National Veterans Service program to be the most dedicated of the dedicated. Furthermore, many Chiefs of Voluntary Service at VA Medical Centers have told us, "Whenever we want something, we can count on the Elks."

In each of the 172 VA Medical Centers there is an Elk committee at work. Literally, thousands of Elks and their families give generously of their time, energy and resources so that the lives of our ill and aging veterans will be enhanced. Hundreds of thousands of hours and like numbers of dollars are devoted to programs that are designed to keep us true to our pledge: *"So long as there are veterans, the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks will never forget them."* And now we've broadened our program to include outpatients and veterans who are homeless.

The purpose of this online resource center is not only to inform the public and our own members of our good works, but also to help our Veterans Service chairmen and committee members live up to our pledge. We've tried to answer the questions most often asked and to spell out the responsibilities of chairmen on all levels. We've also included suggestions to strengthen your program.


Our goal is to make the Elks the most visible force in voluntary service to our veterans. Hopefully this resource center will be useful in that quest.


The Nevada State Elks Association prides itself with the work it performs in support of the Veterans of Nevada. With our many projects, Elks and Helpers have contributed over 6,200 hours of volunteer service and traveled nearly 71,000 miles to serve nearly 5,900 Veterans. The monetary value of these contributions to nearly \$16,000 in cash, over \$103,000 in non-cash items, over \$121,000 in volunteered *hours and over \$36,000 in ** miles traveled for a total of over \$276,000 for Lodge year 2007-2008. * The Federal Government has determined that cost of work done by charitable organizations like the Elks would average \$19.41 per hour if performed by social care and governmental agencies. **Mileage computed at \$0.51 per mile.

ADOPT-A-VET PROGRAM

If you've ever been hospitalized, you know the loneliness and depression you can experience. Think how tough it must be for hospitalized veterans, especially those who are far from home or have no family. With that thought in mind, George Schwarz of Clawson-Troy, Michigan, Lodge devised a simple yet effective solution in 1980: the Adopt-a-Veteran program.

His idea proved so successful that it was picked up by the National Veterans Service Commission in 1983. Each year, Elks Lodges across the nation adopt tens of thousands of veterans. The Elks visited with them on their birthdays and holidays and showered them with gifts and attention. They took those who could leave the medical centers out to dinner, and brought dinner to those who couldn't. Elks provide entertainment, recreation to liven their spirits. The Elks provided these men and women with comfort, companionship, cheer and understanding, and in the process helped lift some of their loneliness.

The object of the Adopt-a-Veteran program is to make the veteran know that they are part of our family, to replace despair with hope, loneliness with fellowship, sadness with joy, and to prove our motto, "So long as there are Veterans, the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks will never forget them."

The response from our members and non-Elks has been overwhelming. Our elected government officials at the local, state and national levels are greatly impressed, and have responded favorably to our initiative.

The "Army of Hope" has many facets and literally any activity that supports our troops and their family falls under this vital program. Lodges are partnering with local and state organizations to adopt units and families to help them through these trying times. Here is just how easy it can be to contribute to this vital program:

The first step in setting up your local program is to identify a lodge chairperson. This position may be especially attractive to a veteran; however any volunteer can chair your program. The first priority of that chairperson is to establish a list of volunteer members who are willing to provide their individual expertise. In addition, a subsequent list identifying the specific skills of each volunteer will also be helpful in matching the needs of families with the skills of the volunteers. (for example: Volunteer John Doe-minor automobile repairs, Volunteer Jane Doe-painting and "back up" child support).

After you have established your "Army of Hope" volunteers, you will need to make contact with your local Reserve and/or National Guard units. When contacting them explain what the program is and how your Lodge can help the families. (It is understood that not every Lodge will be able to handle every request). You can provide the list of volunteers along with their expertise directly to the local Reserve or Guard units. The military units may then contact the Lodge or the volunteers directly, depending on how you set up your local program.

When transporting the trailer, please know that a proper towing vehicle must be used with electrical hook ups. The trailer should always be cleaned (organized and swept clean) after an event and ready for use by the next lodge (don't expect someone else to clean up your mess!) An Elk must be available to stay in with the trailer while in use - never leave the trailer unattended. When transferring the trailer from one lodge to another, there is a mandatory inspection checklist for both the pickup lodge and prior lodge to fill out.

Soccer Shoot

Soccer is one of the fastest growing youth activities in the country. The Elks Soccer Shoot Program is geared to coincide with this sport phenomenon. From toddlers to teens, in our large urban centers to our small suburban settings, soccer is becoming the sport of choice for our youth. This program is the kind of sporting event to help keep our youth focused and away from undesirable activities.

The Elks Soccer Shoot program consists of two different contests that test different level skills at different ages. A "Five Goal Contest" consists of a series of five goals, decreasing in size from 48 inches to 17 inches. The age groups that use these goals are divided into two categories, U-8 contains all ages seven years old and younger, and U-10 group contains ages eight and nine. The contest is open to boys and girls who shoot separately. The U-8 contestants kick from 15 feet from the face of the goal, while the U-10 contestants kick from 18 feet from the goal.

The Grid Goal Contest consists of a full-size goal sectioned off so points can be scored when the ball is kicked into certain sections. The age groups that use this goal are U-12, which contain the ages ten and eleven, and U-14, which contain ages twelve and thirteen. The contest is open to both boys and girls and they shoot separately.

The Marvin M. Lewis Award

The Boy Scouts of America established the Marvin M. Lewis Award in 1998 in recognition of the Elks' significant contributions to Scouting and the development of America's youth.

STATE MAJOR PROJECTS

PROJECT SAFE HAVEN



The Nevada State Elks Association designated Project Safe Haven as its State Major Project in 1990. We continued to support Nevada Division of Child and Family Services through 2020. After a review in early 2020 the Board of Directors felt our program needed to be revamped and expanded to reach the current needs of our communities. After considerable effort the Board determined that St. Jude's Ranch for Children more closely met our Major Project's defined purpose to the community.



For over 52 years, St. Jude's Ranch for Children has offered a beacon of hope for abused, abandoned and neglected children and young people in Nevada. Through tremendous community support and the generosity of their donors, they have been able to break the cycle of abuse, help heal the effects of trauma and inspire children and youth to have hope for a better day while increasing their sense of self-determination.

Their programs include:

Therapeutic Residential Foster Care

A safe and high-quality home environment and individualized holistic care are the hallmarks of this program.

Transitional Living

A program designed to help successfully integrate youth (age 15-18) into society with important life skills as they prepare to age out of foster care.

Pregnant and Parenting Teen

A stable and healthy environment to guide at-risk teens through their pregnancy and motherhood.

Sibling Preservation

Preserving sibling bonds of children separated within the foster care system through specialized events and activities to enhance their relationships.

Transitional Housing

Serving homeless young people with high-quality housing, intensive case management, mentorship and support services.

Rapid Re-Housing

Assisting homeless single parents with children or families with housing in their own community apartment.

Scholarship

Post-secondary educational support for all former residents/clients to support their goals while increasing self-sufficiency through careers and professions.

ST. JUDE'S RANCH FOR CHILDREN - HISTORY

St. Jude's Ranch for Children wasn't a place so much as a dream in the mind of one well-meaning man. "What if we could build a place for neglected children?" He wondered. "How much good could we do?" A lot! For 50 years, St. Jude's Ranch has provided a safe, nurturing home with therapeutic residential treatment services to thousands of abused and neglected children in Nevada. St. Jude's Ranch has made and continues to make a difference by creating new lives with new hope for these children. It all began with Father Jack Adam, an Episcopalian priest, who envisioned a place where neglected children could feel loved. He named the place after St. Jude, the Patron Saint of Desperate Causes. At first, Father Adam's project seemed to be one of those desperate causes, but that changed in 1966 when several members of the community stepped in to help.

Claudine and Shelby Williams assisted with fundraising and organized a successful gala called the "Nite of Stars." With the help of Forrest Duke, the entertainment columnist at the Las Vegas Review Journal, they convinced stars including Jack Henry, Shecky Greene, Bob Hope and Frank Sinatra to perform. Held November 13, 1966, at the Riviera Hotel, the event was a great success, raising more than \$30,000.

Alyan Wartman, an attorney in Boulder City, persuaded City fathers to provide 40 acres of land for a campus. The Sisters of Charity, an order of nuns based in Bristol, England, agreed to care for the children. Builders, contractors and tradesmen offered to help develop the property. St. Jude's Ranch for Children was instituted in 1966, construction began in 1967 and later that year, Eddie - a boy from Elko, Nevada - became the first resident. The Ranch wasn't big or fancy, but the kind people of Southern Nevada quickly embraced the organization and its mission.

The St. Jude's Ranch Women's Auxiliary was established and became the largest and most active support group in the Las Vegas area with more than 400 members. Publicity that had surrounded the Nite of Stars helped bring new supporters to the Ranch family.

Under the leadership of Father Herbert Ward, Executive Director from 1970-2000, St. Jude's Ranch became one of Southern Nevada's most visible and successful nonprofit organizations. Over time, the organization grew and expanded its programs into two locations in Las Vegas, offering related services such as housing for homeless families and singles, employment and education assistance, sibling preservation for families separated in foster care and family support services to provide caregivers skills and resources they need before children are removed from the home.

Today, our campus is a community landmark and an important part of life in Boulder City. Not only do we continue to serve the needs of abused and neglected children and young adults in Nevada, we give tours of our campus, maintain a Thrift Store that is open to the public seven days a week and conduct weddings in our beautiful chapel.

The Healing Center is our newest project being constructed to deal with child sexual exploitation. Child sexual exploitation is one of the most reprehensible and destructive offenses confronting America today. It harms the safety and well-being of our young people; it devastates our families and communities, and it degrades our strength as a community.

No matter what form child exploitation takes - from the creation and circulation of child pornography to the trafficking of children for sex - it demands the full attention of law enforcement, policymakers, community leaders, philanthropists, and service providers, each of whom plays an essential role in combating this unconscionable crime.

The commercial sexual exploitation of children (CSEC) involves the recruitment, harboring, transportation, provision, obtaining, or advertising of a minor child for the purpose of a commercial sex act. Traffickers often prey upon a child's vulnerability and use psychological pressure, violence and intimidation to control the child for financial benefits relating to their sexual exploitation. Purchasers of children for sex encompass all racial, socio-economic and cultural statuses. Child sex trafficking has devastating consequences for its victims, including long-lasting physical and psychological Nevada.

Even though there have been changes over the years, St. Jude's Ranch has remained true to its mission: rescuing abused, abandoned and neglected children and providing a safe, nurturing and therapeutic home for them.

Transforming the lives of abused and at-risk children, young adults and families by empowering them to create new choices and new hope in a caring community.

OUR VISION

To break the cycle of abuse and neglect by mending spirits and renewing hope.

Camp To Belong's was founded in Las Vegas by Lynn Price, herself a former youth-in-care. She later moved to Colorado and the program went with her. **Camp To Belong's** continued to serve youth in our local foster care system but with state lines and cost barriers, so few children from Clark County were able to participate. In 2005, Las Vegas residents Cristine Lindholm and Helsey Husted attended Price's flagship camp session in Colorado as volunteer counselors. Collectively they decided it was time to bring the program back to Nevada. Their leadership efforts included a campsite search, the recruitment of volunteer camp counselors and a fundraising campaign. St. Jude's Ranch for Children became the **Camp To Belong's** Nevada member camp operator in 2008, which marked the third consecutive year of **Camp To Belong Nevada**.

St. Jude's Ranch for Children is a non-profit agency providing many vital supportive services and resources which enrich the lives of children living in foster care in Southern Nevada. The goal of the organization is to work within the system to become a powerful voice for change helping youth in care to light up and grow. Current programs and services include Sibling Preservation (including Camp To Belong Nevada), Academic Success, Mentoring, Cyber Siblings and Youth Leadership.

Camp To Belong's flagship events are their Summer Camp Programs during which they reunite brothers and sisters in a safe, neutral, week-long camp environment to create childhood memories together that they would not have otherwise due to living in separate homes. Each Summer Camp Program provides intentional programming designed to strengthen sibling connection through their Signature Programs, including Art Activities, Sibling Enhancement, Life Seminar, and the Birthday Party event.

Camp To Belong's slogan: **Dedicated to reuniting siblings placed in separate foster homes or other out-of-home care...** clearly states the organization's goal.

At our 2010 Annual Convention the State Major Project Trustees decided to go to the convention floor with a motion to expand our SMP to include sponsoring children to **CAMP TO BELONG, (CTB)**, on a continuing basis. It was agreed to kick off this program with a donation of \$5,000.00 for the first year. The amount of giving continues to grow each year. **Nevada State Elks Association** is proud to partner with the **Camp To Belong Nevada Family and Child Focus** in this outstanding program. 

Our Legacy to the Future

In 1928, one man's dream became a reality for all Elks and the community we serve. Then-National President John F. Malley envisioned a plan that would "unite the forces of the Order into a mighty army for the service of mankind." During the annual Grand Lodge Convention in Miami that year, Malley's call to service inspired delegates to take action by voting to establish the Elks National Foundation with an initial \$100,000 grant.

Today, the mission of the Elks National Foundation is to help Elks build stronger communities. We fulfill this pledge by investing in communities where Elks live and work. We provide tomorrow's leaders, our youth, with a healthy beginning; honor the Elks' pledge to never forget our veterans; help the state Elks associations accomplish their charitable objectives and fund projects that improve the quality of life in local Elks communities.

A board of seven trustees, who are all past national presidents of the Order, governs the Elks National Foundation. The Foundation is located at the Elks national headquarters in the Elks Veterans Memorial in Chicago. The director, Jim O'Kelley, oversees the administration of the Foundation's day-to-day operations. The Foundation also has volunteers at the Lodge, district and state levels to help coordinate our fundraising strategy and implement our programs.

Since inception, the Foundation has received more than \$243.3 million in contributions and bequests. All unrestricted donations go into a permanent endowment fund, where each gift earns interest for lifetimes. Today we boast more than 100,000 active donors and an endowment fund valued at more than \$619.2 million. The ENF has contributed more than \$455.4 million toward Elks' charitable projects nationwide. These funds support our three college scholarship programs, the Elks National Drug Awareness Program, the Elks National Hoop Shoot Free Throw Program, the Elks National Veterans Service Commission, the Community Investments Program, and grants to State Elks Associations.

This year, the ENF will invest a record \$9.77 million in Elks communities through Community Investments Program grants for Elks Lodges. Community Investments Program grants—which include Beacon, Gratitude, Promise and Impact grants—offer your Lodge an opportunity to serve your community in ways that will raise the Lodge's profile, energize the membership, encourage former members to return to the fold, and gain the notice of people who want to be part of an organization that's doing great things.

Thanks to the ongoing support of our donors, the ENF continues to expand on Malley's vision, mobilizing Elks across the country into a force for positive change.
